What were the early beginnings of downtown Laguna Beach? Join Carol Lloyd as she talks about her early homesteading family and the eventual subdivision of downtown Laguna in the 1880s. Henry Rogers and his son, George Rogers, acquired their homesteads in 1878 and 1881. The 160 acres of Henry's homestead ran from Temple Hills to the mesa at Bluebird Canyon. His son, George Rogers' 155.5 acre homestead included the area of downtown Laguna.





Follow Carol as she talks about both her family's early Laguna beginnings and her great great uncle, George Rogers', subdivision of downtown Laguna into 321 lots. She will also share about her extended family's current ownership of specific lots on Forest Ave.

All are welcome to this wonderful program about Laguna's early history.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT

As the business scene in Laguna Beach has changed, as it inevitably does, we recently said goodbye to some of our old favorite dining spots and also welcomed newcomers. We said adios to the Beach house, The Cottage, and Sundried Tomato. We welcomed Driftwood Kitchen, Urth Cafe, and Centrál in their places. If we wished to detail all recent restaurant closures and newcomers it would take several pages in this newsletter.

In 2 years – 2018 – the White House will celebrate its 100th birthday. That makes it the longest operating restaurant in Orange County. Although it has gone by other names such as the Waldorf Astoria and Birds Café (the Bird family bought the restaurant and erected the famous sign "Let the Birds feed you!), its whitewashed exterior color has given it the name we know it by – the White House.

to the 1940s show regular guests Bing Crosby, Mary Pickford, Douglas Fairbanks, and Lillian Gish. A 1938 photo shows Franklin D Roosevelt passing in front of The White House Cafe during a stopover in Laguna Beach.

In the 1950s and 1960s, many big-name jazz artists played at the White House. Yours truly recalls a 1969 appearance by Cannonball Adderley. Reggae and Rock and Roll followed.

In the 1990s, Michael Jordan, Kobe Bryant, Magic Johnson as well as Heather Locklear made the White House the place to be seen. Ms. Locklear was a local Three Arch resident and one can assume that the beachside basketball courts attracted the others.

What is truly inspirational is that many restaurants closed in Laguna Beach during the Great Depression, the hippie era of the 1960s, and the Great Recession of the 21st-century. Business models change, customers tastes change, and food prices and labor laws are always a challenge. Yet for 98 consecutive years, the White House has found a way to open its doors each day for breakfast and close up after dinner and late-night drinks. It has survived numerous ownership changes, several major wars, over a dozen presidents, and countless food fads.

So the next time you're walking on Coast Highway, stop in to the White House and raise a toast to the old girl. She truly is a gem of Laguna Beach history.
